- 12. France was top with 27 gold (102 medals in all,) and the USA in second with 19 gold (48 medals in total).
- 13. Knitting was, but was ultimately not included due to the lack of a competitive element, difficulties in standardizing rules and judging, and concerns about perception.

- 15. Eric Liddell was a devout Christian and missionary who refused to run the 100 metres heats because they were on a Sunday. Fortunately, a teammate who had already won a medal gave up his place in the 400 metres.
- 16. Finland with 14 gold! France was in third place with 13 golds.
- 17. Yes, and no. They are required to be at least 92.5% silver, and are plated with about 6 grams of pure gold.
- 18. Jesse Owens.
- 19. The games were a world showcase for Nazi supposed white Ayrian supremacy but Owens, a black athlete, was by far the most successful in the stadium thereby giving the lie to that odious doctrine.
- 20. Bob Beamon's men's long jump at the 1968 Summer Olympics at 8.90 metres in Mexico City, which also broke the existing world record by 55 cm, and stood as the world record for 23 years until compatriot, Mike Powell, jumped farther in the 1991 World Championships in Athletics in Tokyo. Beamon was greatly assisted by the fact that Mexico City is at an altitude of 2,240 metres above sea level and therefore the air much less dense, whereas Tokyo is at about 40 metres.
- 21. Along the river Seine with boats carrying athletes along famous landmarks, climaxing at the Eiffel Tower. The plan calls for 160 boats to traverse nearly four miles in front of an estimated half million spectators. Maybe!
